EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS

And

This is My Body

Next Saturday, 30 September, the Archdiocese of Philadelphia will host its Eucharistic Congress at Our Lady of Czestochowa Shrine in Doylestown. Several of our parishioners signed up to attend before the celebration reached its capacity a few weeks ago. You can still participate virtually by joining the livestream. It will begin with Archbishop Nelson Pérez leading the congregation in the celebration of the Eucharist at 9:00am. Bishop Michael Burbidge, a Philadelphia native who is now the Ordinary of Arlington, Virginia, will offer the keynote address, "The Sacramental Sacrifice of Christ," at 10:30am. Several notable speakers will offer presentations on the Eucharist in the afternoon. I encourage those who have not signed up yet to do so and take advantage of this important opportunity to join with fellow Catholics throughout our archdiocese in learning about and celebrating this great gift of our faith: the Eucharist. 


Here in our parish, we are continuing our participation in the national Eucharistic Revival in a number of ways. I'm inspired to see more parishioners spending time before our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament during our weekly adoration on Monday beginning after the 8:00am Mass and ending with Benediction at 4:30pm. I have also been encouraged to see that so many copies of Bishop Robert Barron's excellent book, *This is My Body*, have been taken. I hope that you will take the time to read this superb presentation on the Eucharist.

To encourage you to do so, I would like to offer an overview of one of the themes from this book that I have found to be particularly powerful. The first theme that Bishop Barron explores is the Eucharist as a sacred meal; that's the title of the first chapter of this book. Bishop Barron begins with the account of creation found in the Book of Genesis and asks: why did God create? The answer is very simple: God created the heavens and the earth "of his own goodness and almighty power, not for the increase of his own happiness," as the First Vatican Council teaches so clearly. Bishop Barron goes on to explain that the best symbol of creation is the sacred meal, "the banquet at which the Creator shares his life with his grateful creatures." He continues to relate that:

Genesis tells us that God placed Adam and Eve in the midst of the garden of earthly delights and gave them permission to eat from all of the trees in the garden save one (Gen. 2:15-17). He instructed them, in short, to participate in his life through the joy of eating and drinking. (pp. 4-5)

We too often concentrate on the fall of Adam and Eve and fail to remember that it all started with God inviting our first parents to tend his garden and share in the abundance of its blessings, to eat and drink and share in this sacrum convivium (sacred banquet). Tragically, this communion with God was broken when Adam and Eve aspired to be like God. This is symbolized in their eating of the tree of knowledge of good and evil. Only God, the ultimate good, has the fundamental right to determine good and evil. But God is relentless in his love for us and, according to Bishop Barron:



The whole of the scriptural story, though contained in a wide variety of texts written at different times for different purposes, can be seen as a coherent narrative of God's attempt to restore the fallen creation, to reestablish the joy of the banquet. In the language of the biblical scholar N.T. Wright, much of the Bible is the account of God's "rescue operation" for his sad and compromised creation. The choosing of Abraham, the Exodus of the children of Israel from Egypt, the giving of the Law on Sinai, the victories of David and Solomon, the sending of the prophets, the setting up of the temple – all are moments in the story of liberation. And in the Christian reading, the rescue operation culminates in Jesus, who recapitulates, sums up, the sacred history that preceded him. He is the one to whom Abraham looked, he is the final freedom from the slavery of sin; he is the embodiment of the new Law; he is the true successor of David and Solomon; he is the final teller or the divine truth; his body is the new Temple. This entire saga is the story of God's desire to walk once again in friendship with Adam, to sit down once again with the whole of his creation at a great festive banquet. (pp. 6-7)

Bishop Barron continues his study with an excellent reading of the significance of the Passover Meal which, he explains "was a recovery (however imperfect) of the easy unity and fellowship of the Garden of Eden, God hosting a banquet at which his human creatures share life with him and each other" (p. 9). He then moves to the New Testament and examines a few instances of meal fellowship to be found there beginning with the Christmas story:

The account of Jesus' birth in the Gospel of Luke is not, as Raymond E. Brown reminded us, an innocent tale that we tell to children. Instead, all of the drama and edginess of the story of Jesus are adumbrated here. We are meant to notice the contrast between the figure mentioned at the outset of the narrative – Caesar Augustus – and the character who is at the center of the story. Caesar would have been the best-fed person in the ancient world, able at the snap of his fingers to have all of his sensual desires met. But the true king, the true emperor of the world, is born in a cave outside of a forgotten town on the verge of Caesar's domain. Too weak even to raise his head, he is wrapped in swaddling clothes and then laid "in a manger," the place where the animals eat (*Luke* 2:7). What Luke is signaling here is that Jesus had come to be food for a hungry world. Whereas Caesar – in the manner of Eve and Adam – existed to be fed, Jesus existed to be fed upon. He was destined to be, not only the host at the sacred banquet, but the meal itself. (p. 13)

Bishop Barron goes on to explore the significance of a meal in the conversion of Matthew, the feeding of the thousands and, ultimately, the Last Supper. It is very helpful to read the Bible through this lens especially this year as we continue to join with all Catholics throughout our country in the national Eucharistic Revival. I offer you these few citations from *This is My Body* to entice you to read it in its entirety; you will surely find it to be very informational and inspirational!
